

The structure of Rotary is as follows:




District 1120 - which consists of 72 Rotary clubs in the SE of England and over

What are the	responsibilities of	membership?

Attend weekly club meetings whenever possible.
Pay annual dues to the Club of £125 (includes District and International fees)
Participate in local and / or international Rotary activities or projects.
Aspire to club leadership or committee roles.
Service
By participating in local and international service projects, club members can volunteer their time and talents where they're most needed.

What are the qualifications for membership?
Prospective members must:

Hold (or be retired from) a professional, proprietary, executive, managerial, or community position - basically anyone of good character!
Have demonstrated a commitment to service through personal involvement.
Be able to meet the club's weekly attendance requirements, which is no offical minimum, but we hope for an average of 50% attendance.
Live or work within the vicinity of the club or surrounding area.
How do I become a member of Rotary?
Usually a person being considered for membership is invited by a club member to attend one or more club meetings to learn more about how our club works and to meet the other members.
